mas Eve afternoon. He saw lots of hams on the bar. He was told that Ball employees brought the hams in and traded them for booze. The following year Ball gave away the book instead of a ham. Dick shot this story down by pointing out that Prohibition started in 1924.

Visiting with Jar Friends by Joe Coulson

In September I took a wonderful vacation out West with my long-time friend Jim Durr. It was a trip of several Firsts for me.
