#### Fruit Jar Get-Together Show and Tell

Dick Cole started off the Show and Tell portion of the Fruit Jar Get-Together.



Dick displayed two boxes of ARRO #63 (narrow mouth) metal top seal lids. One box was manufactured by Arridor Company, and the other box was manufactured by Ball Brothers Company of El Monte, California. Ball bought out Arridor.

Dick also shared an original draftsman's engineering drawing for a Ball Special Wide Mouth jar. This item got several ooh's and ahhh's from Ball jar collectors. The drawing was created on August 22, 1950 and the jar went into production January 22, 1951. Dick pointed out an interesting note on the drawing which said "Rev. 11-14-55 to show new trade mark and re-arrange lettering".

Phil Smith displayed an aqua quart Mason's Patent Nov. 30<sup>™</sup> 1858 (Reverse: SUN) (no matching lid).



Joe Coulson displayed an unlisted clear quart debossed West Valley Mason (similar to the Atlas Mason Classico pasta jar); and an aqua three quart Rhule's Patent Sep 9<sup>TH</sup> 1879.

Jon Vander Schouw shared a clear quart MASON jar (ground mouth). The top of the jar was deformed and had a slant to it. Jon encourages everyone to look in antique stores, because you just never know what treasure you might find.



Louis Ebert displayed an original advertising price list for fruit jars. A group of companies formed a sales agency to control prices of fruit jars. The price list was dated February 22, 1900.



Lou also displayed a clear 3 1/4 inch "jelly jar" that he recently purchased at a Lowe's home improvement store. The glass item was actually a globe for a porch light, even though it was labeled as a jelly jar.

Dave Rittenhouse shared

a yellow quart RB #1466 The Leader with original clamp. It was a beautiful and very appealing color.



Greg Spurgeon displayed an old tin can with a half gallon fruit jar inside. The jar fit perfectly inside the tin can. The tin can appeared to be from the same time period as the jar. The jar was an aqua Mason's 3 Patent Nov.  $30^{\text{TH}}$ 1858. Greg was not sure why the jar would have been placed inside the tin can.



Greg also shared an unlisted pint ACME jar with an applied collar mouth.

Alan DeMaison told everyone about the upcoming FOHBC National bottle show in Manchester, New Hampshire on July 21. Alan is the Business Manager for the Federation of Historical Bottle Collectors.

Kevin Kellar took everyone's breath away when he displayed an aqua 1/4 PT GLOBE jar; an aqua 1/4 PT Mason's Pat Nov  $30^{\text{TH}}$  (Cross) 1858; and a Ball blue HP Ball Perfection jar with original lid and band. The jars were for sale from his collection.



Mike Jordan displayed an aqua GEM BUTTER JAR with original closure.



Ron Ashby shared an advertising envelope for the Geo. D. Brown company. The envelope had a picture of a fruit jar with a paper product label for Lamb's Tongues. Ron also displayed a clear quart RB #525 jar with a paper product label, and it matched the picture on the advertising envelope!



Ron also displayed a clear pint jelly jar with a fancy design.

Larry Munson displayed a scarce aqua quart Mason's K Patent Nov. 30<sup>™</sup> 1858 (base: L&W).



Larry also shared a clear unembossed half gallon jar that contained current (green style) advertising showing the Ball logo and the name "Smooth Jar". The jar was made in China. Larry purchased this jar recently at an Ace Hardware store, and he wanted to let everyone know that this new jar was available.

Tom Sproat displayed an aqua quart RB #1547 Ludlow's (with repro clamp); a deep green pint #1549 Ludlow's (with repro propeller closure); a quart tin can #1551 (with Ludlow propeller closure); an amber jar with a glass pontil and twelve side panels; and a clear bell-shaped jar with a glass pontil.



Heidi Crupe displayed a candle that she recently purchased at a Target store. The candle was shaped like a Mason jar, and it was made in Hong Kong. Russ Crupe told everyone that he has been finding Ball items lately instead of Atlas items. Russ is known as "Mr. Atlas". Russ displayed three different slug plates used in molds for Ball Corporation commemorative drinking mugs. The commemorative mugs were produced at the Washington, Pennsylvania glass manufacturing plant.



Joe Merkel displayed an aqua PT #1921-9 Mason's (CFJCo monogram) Patent Nov.  $30^{\text{TH}}$  1858 (heel: Glass Bottle Made By Melbourne Bottle Co.). There are only three examples of this jar known. Joe was able to purchase this jar from the collection of Don Burkett.



Joe also displayed a clear Mason's Patent Nov.  $30^{\text{TH}}$  1858 straight-sided pint. The mold shape was similar to that of the letter and shield jars. This was a really good jar find at an estate auction.

Jeff Klingler shared an aqua midget PT Mason's Pa-

tent Nov. 30<sup>TH</sup> 1858 (Reverse: HGCo monogram); a clear QT #2429 Pyramid (in circle) (acquired from Jamie Houdeshell); a clear PT #2429 Pyramid (in circle) (acquired from Richard Franks); a Ball blue midget PT Mason's Patent Nov. 30<sup>TH</sup> 1858; and an aqua half gallon #2552 San Francisco Glass Works wax sealer.



Bruce Schank mentioned that 30 years ago (January 1983) Edmund F. Ball was at the Muncie Show. Bob Rhineberger brought a dark amber #234 Ball (3-L) Mason to the show. Mr. Ball handled the jar and said that it was a "mistake". A photo of Mr. Ball holding the jar was printed in the club newsletter.

Bruce donated a framed copy of his "Jar Bling" poem to Bob Rhineberger for all that he has done for the hobby over the years. Bob was in attendance and gratefully accepted the poem.

Clinton Brandt displayed a silver-plated Ball Brothers Glass Mfg. Co. letter opener. A gushing oil well was depicted on one side, and a Ball (3-L) Mason on the other side.

Clinton also mentioned that he has a collection of about 600 jars for sale. You can visit him in Monroe, Michigan to see what he has. Junne Barnett
